+ For Advanced Studios, students may select from among all advanced studio courses offered including BE and study abroad studio courses taught by LA faculty. Additionally, students may substitute 1 advanced studio with a "wildcard" studio course (a studio course NOT taught by LA faculty).

* Previous graduate level coursework or professional experience may be used to meet the requirement (up to 12 credits). Approval by the Graduate Program Advisor is required.

Waived courses do not count towards credits earned. Waived courses must be replaced with an Open Elective course of equal credits. See [MLA Curriculum Description](#) for waiver requirements for individual courses.

A maximum of 12 credits of LARCH 600 Independent Studies allowed.

A maximum of 9 credits of LARCH 601 Internship is allowed.

A minimum total of 72 credits (400+ level) is required for MLA degree.

Students must take a minimum of 10 credits per quarter for "fulltime" status. Fulltime tuition costs apply when taking between 7-18 credits. Any credits over 18 credits require additional tuition costs.
